Thanks to the Faithful Fools Street Ministry in San Francisco I never pass the opportunity to pick up a stray penny off the street. It is a moment of communion with the one who was its last possessor and with the year stamped on its face that carries me back to a year of impressions overlaid upon each other until the memories have grown me a Sequoia—a tall and upright life, relishing every season that we have shared together in community.

Birth through Four Years

We provide a safe, clean environment in which to support each child in initiating play activities at the developmental level they manifest. Each week our paid staff members, Maria Elena Olvera and Sandra Soletto, provide a loving presence as they engage children in games, stories and crafts with seasonal and holiday themes throughout the year.

Children & Youth Classes

Children and youth in Preschool (4 years) through high school join the community for the first part of worship at 11:00 am and then go to their respective classes until 12:30 pm.

Pre K (4 years) through First Grade – *Creating Home*

Second through Fourth Grades – *Moral Tales*

Children participate in the Unitarian Universalist Association curriculum *Moral Tales*, which can be reviewed at <http://tinyurl.com/moraltales>.

Music and Yoga

Children from PreK through Fourth Grade are engaged in music with leaders Sally Cooperrider and Nayo Ulloa <http://www.nayoulloa.com> for three Sundays in May. The morning includes 30 minutes of singing and music using Orff percussion instruments, and for the second 30 minutes the children will experience yoga with Shirley Worth.

On two Sundays there will be a Social Justice Project. And on Celebration Sundays, children will be together with the whole community in worship.

Fifth Grade – *Neighboring Faiths*

This year-long curriculum helps youth learn about their own faith and other faith traditions through interactive experience such as field trips and interviews. These encounters with other religions are given meaning through periods of reflection and discussion about Unitarian Universalist and personal beliefs and values.

Sixth through Eighth Grades – *Junior High Youth Group*

The junior high youth group meets on Sundays from 11:30-12:30 and learns about Unitarian Universalism by visiting congregations in our area. They organize monthly social activities on the first Friday of the month. Class Coordinator: Pam Pell johnpell@aol.com

Ninth through Twelfth Grades – *Senior High Youth Group*

The senior high youth group meets from 11:30 am-12:30 pm most Sundays. The group engages in discussions about issues most relevant to

youth's lives and communities, plans social and service projects throughout the year, and participates in youth conferences in area UU churches under the auspices of the Pacific Central District of Unitarian Universalist Congregations and YRUU (Young Religious Unitarian Universalists). The youth group's empowering philosophy educates youth to be leaders within the group, church community, and denomination. 

The most important meeting of the year, in many ways, is the annual congregational meeting for our election of officers, for all of us to participate in our democracy. It will take place right after the worship service on March 27. Please be there!

Prospective membership in the Silicon Valley Interreligious Council was proposed by **Joy Ellen Lipsky**. The board voted to place this question

before all of you at the March 27 Congregational Meeting.

Richard Hobbs spoke to the board on behalf of the Human Agenda program. They are planning an "Emulation Tour of Cuba" this summer (see below). Further documentation concerning what their sponsorship request entails will be developed by **Rev. Geoff** and **Madeline Morrow** for the March 27 Congregational Meeting. Sponsorship of a religious organization is essential for them to work around the roadblocks imposed by our government on travel to Cuba.

The Program and Operations Committee will furnish Watkins

Award nominees to the board before our next meeting for consideration and presentation at our Annual Meeting at the end of May.

Rev. Geoff told us about a Memorial service for **Betsy Germer** on March 13, reminding us of her important contributions over many years, especially regarding music. He will also meet with our youth and advisors on dealing with grief and personal loss.

Finally, Rev. Geoff complimented us all on the ministerial discretionary fund, which has received generous donations over the past year, matching the considerable increase in requests from people in dire need during these hard times. ●

Joining the Silicon Valley Interreligious Council

One of the items up for consideration at our annual congregational meeting March 27 will be whether we want to join the new Silicon Valley Interreligious Council (SiVIC).



SiVIC emerged from discussions among a varied coalition of religious communities. They include the Silicon

Valley Partner City Group of the Parliament of the World's Religions, non-profit agencies, educational institutions, and governmental offices in Santa Clara County. **Rev. Nancy Palmer Jones** and **Joy-Ellen Lipsky** were active participants in SiVIC's precursors, the South Bay Interfaith group and the Interfaith Dialogues (SVFaces) group. UUs took part in the planning and steering committees that launched SiVIC, which was inaugurated on March 6, 2011.

SiVIC aims to build interreligious harmony and understanding to promote a just and compassionate society in Silicon Valley. Specifically, it seeks to:

- ❖ Build relationships among religious communities
- ❖ Provide leadership and a voice for the interreligious community
- ❖ Encourage shared action and service
- ❖ Educate ourselves and our community about our religious diversity
- ❖ Work cooperatively with local, regional, national and global interreligious organizations.

As a member, our congregation will have visibility in SiVIC's presence online, at events, in collateral materials

GA 2011 will provide a full dress rehearsal of all aspects of off-site participation, in preparation for full operation of the service at GA 2012. For the GA 2011 trial, off-site delegate votes will be tallied and reported but will not count in GA decisions.
