Being President: What's it Like? (Installment 1) by Bob Miess

his is the beginning of a series of articles about the office of President of our church. I've been President of the congregation now for the last 28 months. Several times over these months people have asked me, "What's it like?" Depending on when they asked they may have heard different answers...

First Answer: "Impossible"

I became President on April 1, 2005. Yes, April Fools Day is when our Board and Officers take office! Perhaps there's a message there? Anyway, until that day I had been the Vice President of Programs, a position that has now been replaced by that of the Program Officer, currently held by **Julia Rodriguez.** Being President then meant taking lay responsibility for the governance and management of the church (with a lot of help and support from the ministers and other lay leaders).

Together with the Executive Committee, which essentially consisted of the church officers, I set the agenda for the board meetings and the congregational meetings, and I chaired those meetings. That was the easy part! There were many committees and plenty of activities and groups in the church, and in some sense I was responsible for all of them. If something needed to be done, it was

at least in part my responsibility to see that it was done. For every serious issue that arose, it was my responsibility to see that it was dealt with properly. My inbox was full of e-mails, and my phone rang frequently.

Frankly, the job was more than one volunteer should take on. I was always in awe of those who did it. During my time on the board, I had seen **Dena Dickinson**, then Ed Massey, and finally Mary Mary **Feldman** shoulder this responsibility. I could not imagine how they could do it, or how those who came before them had done it. After (and actually before) I had taken the position, I was not sure how I would do it either. Indeed, if you asked me then what the job was like, you may have gotten an answer like "impossible," or "more than you can believe. "But I had one thing going for me – I knew that changes were in the works that would transform the Presidency into something that a person could do.

In future articles, I'll tell you how things have changed, and boy have they changed!

If you have a regularly scheduled meeting, or a special event that is not currently on the online calendar, and you'd like to schedule it, send me an e-mail with the following:


- 1. The group wishing to schedule the event.
- 2. The name and contact information for the "person in charge."
- 3. The event title.
- 4. The date(s) and time(s) the event starts and ends (for repeating events, you can give me instructions like "every other Monday" or "the first Tuesday of every month".
- 5. The amount of setup time and cleanup time you need before and after the event.
- 6. The room(s) you would like to reserve.
- 7. A description of the event that would help people to know whether it would be of interest to them.
- 8. If you want people to be able to "register" for the event online, let me know.

If you see any potential conflicts on the calendar, let me know, and we'll work it out. If you know of events that are scheduled, but no longer occur, please let me know. If you don't have access to the web, or you have a question, give me a call.

Improving Children's Health Care: How You Can Help

While your First Unitarian Church PACT LOC leaders are busy determining how we can take local action on environmental justice issues (issues such as a plastic carry-bag ban similar to those in San Francisco and Oakland, banning corn-based ethanol use for the city fleet, eliminating or reducing the permit fee for installing solar panels, etc.), our fellow seekers of social justice are working on children's health. They have asked us to ask you to consider supporting their action calls.

Here's what you might do:

First, take a trip to LA and on Saturday, August 11th join the UULM-CA and many others at "The Great L.A. Health Rally" that will take place at 1:00 pm on the south lawn of Los Angeles' City Hall, located at First and Spring Streets. **Suzanne Marsh,** Intern Minister, UULM-CA, writes, "The purpose of the rally is to encourage lawmakers to eliminate insurance companies from the health care equation and guarantee universal coverage for all in California. It will begin with a procession of hearses from Santa Monica to the City Hall and will feature live music, celebrity speakers such as Lily Tomlin, legislator Sheila Kuehl, Lt. Governor John Garamendi and others. It promises to be quite a day and another opportunity to let our Governor and legislators know where we stand. We are making progress, but we must keep up the pressure on our legislators in order to ensure that all Californians have affordable, quality healthcare!"

Second, on **Sunday, August 19, 2007** show up for a **PACT Health Care For All Community Action Meeting** at 12:15-1:30 pm at Cambrian Park United Methodist Church, 1919 Gunston Avenue, San Jose. Invited Guests include Assemblyman Jim Beall, Assemblywoman Sally Lieber, Assemblyman Joe Coto, Senator Elaine Alquist, Senator Abel Maldonado, and Supervisor Ken Yeager.

Third, be part of **PICO's National Compassion Sabbath – Compassion Sunday**, by placing phone calls to your members of Congress, via a particular phone number. Call PICO's toll free number 877-367-5235 to reach the Congressional Switchboard, ask to speak with the legislative staff person responsible for health care issues. Let them know that you and many others are very concerned about the number of uninsured children in the community and the nation. Tell the staff person that the congregation wants the Member of Congress to support a strong SCHIP Reauthorization bill that includes \$50 billion to help states cover millions of uninsured children.

And to help you do your homework; to learn more about the pending SCHIP Reauthorization needs, to consider whether to support these health care actions, here are some on-line resources:

Community March to End Homelessness and Poverty

oin CHAM, the Affordable Housing
Network, Santa Clara County Collaborative on Affordable Housing and Homeless
Issues, and others in a large march on
Monday, August 27 in downtown San Jose. We
call on Congress and the Federal government
to take action to rapidly end homelessness
and poverty in America once and for all.

- Section 8 Vouchers: Increase HUD funding to provide an additional 59,000 Section 8 vouchers for Santa Clara County. This is the number of families and individuals currently on the Section 8 waiting list.
- 2. NHTF: Pass the National Affordable Housing Trust Fund legislation. The NHTF would fund the construction of 1.5 million low-income housing units 75% for extremely low-income households over 10 years.
- A right to housing: Legislation giving everyone in the U.S. a right to decent, affordable housing in a good neighborhood.

The Federal Government has the authority, the power, and the funds to end homelessness and poverty in America immediately, as called for by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. However, Congress will not act unless we the people create the political will to make it happen.
